



4 characteristics of resonance

- Something or someone "touches me", "calls me", "appeals to me"
- I interact and experience self-efficacy as well as transformation – I am changed
- Resonance is uncontrollable, nondisposable, not feasible, not predictable (examples: snowfall, music, a conversation, religious buildings)






## Background

Theory of Resonance (Rosa, 2016/2021), a "sociology of our relationship to the world" or a "sociology of the good life"

4 basic relationships

- to oneself
- to other persons
- to the material everyday world
- To the world as a whole ("vertical resonance axes" – religion, "the voice of nature", "the power of art", the mantle of history")






The core of religion is "the idea of an acommodating, responding world"

Rosa's theory of resonance as a theory of spirituality?



## Cultivating spiritual sensibility to address 21st century challenges

"We need the spiritual to play a greater role in the public realm, because it highlights the importance of connecting personal and social and political transformation. [...] The overarching societal role of spirituality [...] is to serve as a counterweight to the hegemony of instrumental and utilitarian thinking." (p. 8)

The meta-crisis behind present ecological, social and political crises is a spiritual one.

We need to address the deeper questions of what the meaning of life and this world is, what it means to live a good life ...

## Some conclusions for Public Theology

- Spirituality as a transreligious concept with multireligious references
- Spirituality as a bridging concept that helps to find an "overlapping consensus" on what human flourishing is about
- Public theology is not only about theological or ethical contents, it also addresses the public significance of spiritual practice (e.g. Forster & Marchinowski, 2024; Wabel, Höhne & Stamer, 2017)
- Our traditions of "public spirituality": e.g. M. L. King and his Civil Rights
   Movement; "political prayer" in the German New Political Theology of the 1960s;
   "peace prayers" in East-Germany supporting the protests that led to the fall of
   the Iron Curtain
- Interreligious collaboration and exchange should be intensified, e.g.
  multireligious prayer meetings (often reacting to political developments) in the
  context of Religions for Peace
